OUR KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Gloria Ladson-Billings is the former Kellner Family Distinguished Professor of Urban Education in the Department of Curriculum and Instruction and faculty affiliate in the Department of Educational Policy Studies at the University of Wisconsin–Madison. She was the 2005-2006 president of the American Educational Research Association (AERA). Ladson-Billings' research examines the pedagogical practices of teachers who are

successful with African American students. She also investigates Critical Race Theory applications to education. She is the author of the critically acclaimed books The Dreamkeepers: Successful Teachers of African American Children and Crossing Over to Canaan: The Journey of New Teachers in Diverse Classrooms, and numerous journal articles and book chapters. She is the former editor of the American Educational Research Journal and a member of several editorial boards. Her work has won numerous scholarly awards including the H.I. Romnes Faculty Fellowship, the NAEd/Spencer Postdoctoral Fellowship, and the Palmer O. Johnson outstanding research award. During the 2003-2004 academic year, she was a fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences at Stanford University. In fall of 2004, she received the George and Louise Spindler Award from the Council on Anthropology and Education for significant and ongoing contributions to the field of educational anthropology. She holds honorary degrees from Umeå University (Umeå, Sweden), University of Massachusetts-Lowell, the University of Alicante (Alicante, Spain), the Erickson Institute (Chicago), and Morgan State University (Baltimore). She is a 2018 recipient of the AERA Distinguished Research Award, and she was elected to the American Academy of Arts & Sciences in 2018.

PRESENTERS



Dawnene D. Hassett is a professor in the literacy area of the Department of Curriculum & Instruction at University of Wisconsin–Madison. She researches the foundational roles of play and imagination in early literacy education, and she studies how children read and write complex and visually interactive texts. She sees literacy as a process of making meaning through written, visual, and oral language, and she promotes reading and writing

pedagogies that support, respect, and truly love students of all ages for the

meaning-makers they are. Professor Hassett also directs the Wisconsin State Reading Teacher and Reading Specialist License Programs for expert literacy teachers. She was an elementary school teacher (grades K, 1, & 3) and a reading specialist (pre-K-12) for 13 years. She received her PhD in 1999 in Curriculum Theory from the University of Wisconsin–Madison.



Peter Wardrip is an Assistant Professor of STEAM Education at the University of Wisconsin–Madison. His research focuses on informal/formal learning collaborations, professional learning for educators, formative assessment and making as a learning process. Peter grew up in Racine, WI and enjoys playing soccer, euchre and drinking hot cocoa with his family.



Mark Dziedzic is a Senior Outreach Specialist and the Director of the Greater Madison Writing Project, University of Wisconsin–Madison's affiliate of the National Writing Project. He has been facilitating professional learning and teacher action research with pre-K-12 educators from across WI with the School of Education's outreach office since 2009. Prior to joining the outreach office, Mark was an elementary and middle

school teacher in Colorado and Wisconsin. He also taught a methods course and supervised student teachers in the University of Wisconsin–Madison Elementary Education program.



Bryn Orum is an Outreach Specialist for the Greater Madison Writing Project where she coordinates programs for youth and educators. Key projects include Rise Up & Write: a youth advocacy writing summer camp, and the College, Career, and Community Writers Program (C3WP): a National Writing Project program that supports the teaching of evidence-based argument writing. Previously, she co-founded and taught high school English

at Clark Street Community School in Middleton, WI. Bryn studied Literacy and English at University of Wisconsin–Madison where she earned her BA and MS. Much of her work in education has focused on equitable and innovative environments.






